Rocklands Bird Sanctuary is home to some of Jamaica's most exquisite species of bird.

A variety of birds fly around feeders while visitors watch in amazement.

This place is a must see if you are a bird or nature lover!



The bird sanctuary is located at a quaint little house, home to a local Jamaican. The setting here is absolutely peaceful and relaxing.



This outing is very simplistic. You sit on a chair under a covered porch with some seeds in your hand. Before you know it birds will be sitting on your lap and feeding right out of the palm of your hand. When else in you lifetime can you say you've had a wild hummingbird sit on your lap or finger?!



You are also given a small bottle of sugar water, which attracts the birds that land all around you.



You can take a leisurely stroll to see more birds and flora. Ensure you bring along your sugar water bottle — hummers will follow you around and request drinks as you stroll. Don't forget to bring your camera. You should not pass up the opportunity to take a photo with Jamaica's national bird — the beautiful Doctorbird [Red-billed Streamertail; http://10000birds.com/what-is-the-national-bird-of-jamaica.htm] and there are many of them here. The birds here are wild, free and move very quickly. It is a wonderful and organic experience and should not be missed.

*Endemic means it is found only on the island of Jamaica and nowhere else in the world.
